WORLD EARTH DAY 2009

In the run up to World Earth Day, Wednesday 22nd April, we are reminded that environmental issues, both local and regional, require as much attention today as in past years and that there is no room for complacency. This past weekend the ESG received calls on strong bunkering fumes sweeping residential areas, the CEPSA Oil Refinery flaring again and discharging noxious clouds of chemicals and saw the MoD power station sweeping the south district with thick clouds of smoke as happens frequently. We are reminded that we still have a long way to go to curb harmful practices, never mind rise to the challenge of avoiding the worst effects from climate change which demands that we look after Mother Earth.





We are told that the life style enjoyed by much of the west is impossible to sustain given the rise in urbanisation and consumption of earths raw materials- we are told that the subsequent waste from such mindless consumption is resulting in the warming of our planet and potential havoc in an undetermined but not too far off time scale.

On Earth Day as in other days which mark our environment we are asked to examine how we are reacting to these enormous issues? The difficulty of course is that economies today rely on growth in consumption and if this is reduced for all the right reasons, it could destabilise global markets even further- this is already happening due to the banking crisis. Gibraltar cannot and should not race ahead with massive development, both impactful and energy hungry, and not at least meet these needs by launching a renewable energy system and the forest that was promised.

It is time for green action at individual, business and government level.
